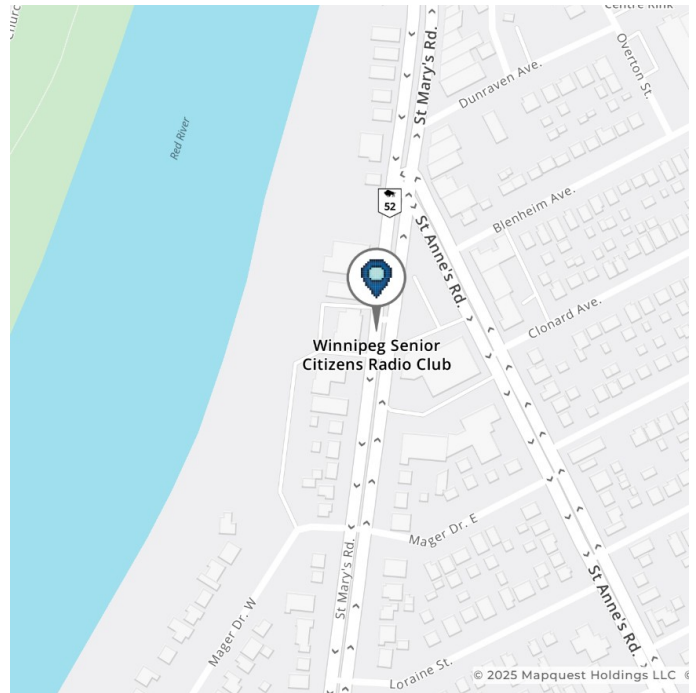

MUUG has moved to a new location to start the new season. Winnipeg Senior Citizens Radio Club (WSC) has graciously offered to host MUUG meetings going forward. Several current and past MUUG members are also members of WSC. MUUG President Wyatt Zacharias will be our WSC liaison and duty officer.

WSC is located at 598 St. Mary's Road, 2nd Floor, a block South from the St. Mary's / St. Anne's fork, on the West side beside the Miller's Meats. It's in the old fire hall, so you really can't miss it! Look for the red doors.

NPM Hit by Major Supply Chain Attack

In one of the largest supply chain attacks seen in recent memory, a group of hackers compromised several widely used JavaScript packages on NPM—collectively downloaded billions of times weekly. The attackers gained control through a phishing campaign targeting package maintainers. In one confirmed case, the attacker impersonated NPM support via a spoofed email domain and tricked a maintainer into resetting their two-factor authentication (2FA), allowing the attacker to push malicious updates to trusted packages.

The injected malicious code was designed to silently hijack cryptocurrency transactions. It operated by detecting when users interacted with Ethereum, Solana, Bitcoin, or Tron wallets, and stealthily replaced legitimate wallet addresses with those controlled by the attacker. Although the compromised packages were quickly flagged and removed—some within hours—the potential scope of exposure is vast due to how widely these packages are used throughout the JavaScript and Node.js ecosystem.

This breach highlights ongoing vulnerabilities in the open-source software supply chain, particularly around maintainer security and the ease of social engineering attacks. It also underscores the need for better ecosystem-level safeguards, like alerts for suspicious package updates, stricter domain verification, and automatic anomaly detection. Developers are advised to audit dependencies, lock versions, and remain vigilant for phishing attempts, especially those impersonating platform support teams.

Intel Layoffs Leave Key Linux Drivers Orphaned

Intel's recent wave of layoffs has impacted several Linux driver maintainers, leaving multiple hardware

drivers without active upstream support. This includes: Intel WWAN IOSM, Keem Bay DRM, Ethernet RDMA, T7XX 5G WWAN, and others.

These drivers are critical for networking, embedded systems, and hardware acceleration. With maintainers gone, these components risk stagnation or eventual removal if no one steps up. This has sparked renewed discussion about corporate responsibility in open source and how projects handle at-risk subsystems.

Cloud Hypervisor Project Bans AI-Generated Code

The Cloud Hypervisor project (under the Linux Foundation) has officially banned contributions generated or heavily derived from AI tools like GitHub Copilot or ChatGPT. For legal/license ambiguity (e.g., GPL conflicts), Code quality concerns and long-term maintainability risks.

Free Internet!!

Two Winnipeg non-profits are launching a community-driven project to bring free, reliable internet to the city's North End, starting with antennas installed on rooftops at key community hubs. Led by North End Connect and the Internet Society Manitoba Chapter, the initiative aims to connect 20 households this fall as a pilot, with a long-term goal of reaching up to 1,000 homes.

Sparked by the pandemic's digital access gaps, the project focuses on connectivity while empowering the community through student training and better access to education, jobs, and resources.
